Partner Emma Russell and London Associate Emily Fuller wrote a chapter titled: “[Comparing the European, U.S. and Asian fund finance markets.](#)” The chapter considers the differences between these markets’ approaches to fund finance from a high-level market perspective and the contrasting nuances of transactions in the markets.

“Over the last few years there has been a shift by certain banks in Europe to an approach more akin to that taken in the U.S,” Russell and Fuller write. “By comparison, the Asian market is still primarily relationship-driven, both by lender relationships with fund sponsors and, in many instances, with investors. This results in more bespoke covenant structures and deal terms.”
